

COLLEGE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

Tuesday, December 6, 2016 • 1:30 p.m. – 2:30 p.m. • N-206

McMahon called the meeting to order at 1:35 p.m.

A. Approval of the Agenda

Ramsey moved to approve the agenda, seconded by Bell, and all responded in favor.

B. Approval of Previous Minutes

Bell moved to approve the 11/29/16 minutes, seconded by Hopkins, and all responded in favor.

C. Guests/Introductions

Laura Murphy was introduced, and Briele Warren (who was taking minutes for Steve Quis).

D. Updates from the Chancellor's Cabinet

Hsieh reported on the Chancellor's Cabinet Update data as of December 5th, and shared that Miramar has scheduled 206 FTES for the Intersession, and that online sections account for 75% of the total FTES of City, Mesa, and Miramar Colleges. Hsieh also noted the High Demand section of the attachment, and said that of the 51 waitlisted sections for Intersession, 43 are online, and Hsieh noted that this was part of the reason to certify all of the college instructors to teach online.

Hsieh commented on Miramar's numbers on the Enrollment Report as of December 3rd, and the 2016-17 totals compared to the target.

Hsieh brought up an attachment regarding the Basic Skills English Workgroup Update, and noted a new course of ENGL 29, which would enable students to enroll in ENGL 101 with additional support. Hsieh asked if activating this new course meant that the original four courses that the students would go through to enroll in ENGL 101 would be deactivated. Ascione and Hopkins responded that the courses would not be deactivated, as it takes a long time to set up a course.

Hsieh reported on the District Strong Workforce Program Plan, and commented that Ornelas would likely have more information, as she is part of the regional group. Ornelas shared that they planned to finish the plan by December 16th. Hsieh asked if the plan could be provided to her ahead of time so that she could review before signing, and Ornelas responded that it was web-based, and that to the best of her knowledge, signatures were not needed. Hsieh asked for clarification, as the attachment mentioned that the 'College certifies' the plan, and Ornelas replied that she was not sure what the attachment was implying, but it was her understanding that signatures were not required.

Hsieh shared the Fall 2016 FTES Target and Completion Comparisons attachment, and in presenting Miramar's numbers, noted that Miramar's FTES projections listed do not include the Academy/in-service FTES. She has continued to stress this to everyone at the District and campus so that it is not forgotten.

Hsieh brought up an attachment listing the San Diego Promise Activities at the different colleges, and asked Ramsey to verify if the outreach to Continuing Education site at Miramar needed to be included on the list (as there was currently nothing referencing it). If it needed to be included, she asked that it be added for accurate reporting.

Hsieh reported that Miramar was hiring additional faculty in fall 2016 to start spring 2017, and shared an attachment listing the positions that were in progress.

Hsieh mentioned that the District was considering a slightly different logo look, and showed an attachment of the current logo, and Options A-C of different examples. She noted that at this point, it looked like the District was going to go with Option B.

<p>Recommendations List had been prepared with the prioritized lists from all of the divisions, and had been combined and prioritized at a campus-wide level by the three Vice Presidents. Bell noted that the Administrative and Instructional divisions had actually both put forward the same position (a Female Athletic Equipment Attendant in the Hourglass area) at a high ranking, and for this reason, this position was placed at the number one ranking for campus-wide.</p> <p>Administrative Services had the position at #1 on their division list, and Instructional Services had the position at #3.</p> <p>McMahon asked if it were possible to have an equivalent list of the current hiring stages of the various classified staff positions in the same way as the faculty positions were listed in the specific stage of their progress. Bell indicated that he could provide this list. Hsieh responded that the CEC could bless it. No questions or concerns were raised.</p>

2	<p>Implementation of Cultural & Ethnic Diversity Plan (attachment)</p> <p>Hsieh brought up the Diversity Committee plan, presented by Darrel Harrison at the 11/29/16 CEC meeting, and given to the CEC on 12/1/16. Hsieh noted that the plan had been reviewed by the CEC and managers in the past couple of days, and that feedback was incorporated, but it was unfortunate that there were no representatives at the meeting from the Diversity & International Education Committee in order to comment on the feedback.</p> <p>The feedback and notes were discussed goal by goal, column by column.</p> <p>Hsieh noted that while the plan had good intent, there were many parts to the document that did not align with College and District processes and procedures, and there seemed to be some confusion in this regard. Murphy agreed, and mentioned that that the plan’s goals, actions, and responsible parties did not seem to connect or flow. Jacobson commented that the plan was ambitious, and contained a lot of work.</p> <p>For Goal 1, Murphy said that the ‘composition of the student population’ and the ‘surrounding community’ were two different things, and that the action plan did not seem to directly address this goal. It was also noted that the data mentioned in the action plan was handled by the District Equal Employment Opportunity Office, and Human Resources, and this information was protected. It was recommended that an additional action plan be included for this goal, in order to fully address all aspects of it. It was recommended to remove the spring 2017 portion of the evidence of actions (Task Force Chair attending the Miramar Managers meeting to discuss the process for diversity hires), and Hsieh mentioned that the information was previously listed in spring 2016, but since it was not done, and</p>	3	I, III, & IV	Hsieh, Hubbard, & Arancibia

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	<p>attendance was never requested, it could be removed. Miramontez commented that the ‘Campus Researcher’ in the recommendations to responsible parties was incorrect, and needed to be updated to ‘College Research Office.’ Murphy recommended updating the language across the board in the plan to say ‘ethnically diverse,’ as it was inconsistent in listing the terms ‘diverse,’ or ‘ethnically diverse.’</p> <p>For Goal 2, Hsieh and Beitey noted the inclusion of the Site Compliance Officer language into the plan, as this important piece was not reflected before. Miramontez noted that the ‘Accreditation Liaison Officer’ should be removed from the recommendations to responsible parties, and that it should read ‘College Research Office.’</p> <p>For Goal 3, Hsieh caught a sentence structure correction, and said to delete the word ‘to’ from ‘DIEC requests <u>to</u> the District HR Offices through the...’</p> <p>For Goal 4, Ascione said that the ‘Filipino Language’ course wording should be removed from the plan, as the action plan did not detail anything regarding to language. After comments from Miramontez, Ramsey, and Murphy, it was recommended that another action plan be added regarding attraction/recruitment and retention of underrepresented groups. It was noted in the evidence of actions section that the LGBTQ and Campus Pride portions did not seem to directly relate to the goal, and should probably be removed. It was recommended that in the recommendations to responsible parties, the Curriculum Committee be added, as any course additions would need to go through them.</p> <p>For Goal 5, Hsieh reported that the original wording of ‘Campus Hour’ was changed to the correct term of ‘College Hour,’ and the inclusion of the Dean of Student Affairs to the recommendations for responsible parties was noted. Jacobson commented on the need for faculty and staff to understand that college protocol needed to be followed for the public to hold any sessions or rent any facilities on campus.</p> <p>After the discussed recommendations and changes, there were no additional questions. It was agreed to accept to the plan with the recommended changes. Hsieh said that the plan would be sent out once more to the CEC so that everyone could confirm the changes recommended at the meeting, and in doing this, none of the language in the Self-Evaluation Study would need to be changed.</p>

Three Weeks After Credit Colleges' Priority Registration Begins

Data as of December 5, 2016

Sections

Districtwide, the number of sections for 2017 Intersession sections is 249 (City/ECC 49, Mesa 133, Miramar 67). The total number of fully and partially online classes this Intersession is 147 (City/ECC 26, Mesa 78, Miramar 43).

FTES

The total FTES for Spring Intersession 2017 at the credit colleges is 434.4 (City/ECC 81.3, Mesa 246.8, Miramar 106.3). Online sections account for 75% of the total FTES.

Headcount

Unduplicated headcount for Spring 2017 intersession credit colleges is 3,527 (City/ECC 733; Mesa 2,188; and Miramar 1,031). Headcount for Spring 2017 intersession for credit colleges online only students is 2,326 (City/ECC 504; Mesa 1,459; and Miramar 779).

Enrollment

Enrollment for Intersession 2017 at All Colleges is 4,698 (City/ECC 802, Mesa 2,660, and Miramar 1,236). Enrollment for Intersession 2017 credit colleges online classes is 3,393 (City/ECC 568 Mesa 1,879, and Miramar 946).

High Demand

There are currently 51 waitlisted sections in Intersession 2017 (21% of all sections offered). Of the Intersession 2017 waitlisted sections, 8 are on campus sections (9% of all on campus sections offered) and 43 are online sections (29% of all online sections offered). There are 321 waitlisted seats and 300 students on wait lists.

Spring 2017

Research indicates that larger numbers of students are being placed into long basic skills sequences; consequently many do not succeed or proceed to transfer level courses. ACCUPLACER is considered to be a biased placement tool that inaccurately assesses students. Additionally, SDCCD uses a cut score of 80, but the national average is 106 which adds to the placement issue.

 - **Avoid Supplanting:** Funds appropriated to community college districts for local or regional share investment shall supplement, not supplant, existing funding of community college career technical education programs. This shall not be interpreted to mean that a participating community college district is prohibited from eliminating or altering existing programs, but the percentage of that community college district's total full-time equivalent students enrolled in career technical education courses relative to the total full-time equivalent students enrolled in the district shall not be reduced from the percentage computed for the 2015–16 fiscal year. *For SDCCD, CTE FTES is 28% of total FTES in 2015-16.*
 - **Show Benefit to SWP Outcomes:** Funds expended must show a direct benefit to the requirements of the Strong Workforce Program outcomes of increasing the number of quality students or programs in CTE courses programs and pathways and addressing the recommendations of the Strong Workforce Task Force.
 - **Avoid Duplication of Effort:** To avoid duplication of effort, activities funded under the Strong Workforce Program shall be informed by, aligned with, and expand upon the activities of existing workforce and education regional partnerships, including those partnership activities that pertain to regional planning efforts established pursuant to the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (Public Law 113-128), adult education block grant consortia, and K-12 career technical education programs.
 - **Follow District Procedures:** All fiscal policy and program procedures adopted by the applicable Community College District shall be followed when expending allocations.
- January 27, 2017: District certifies and submits plans via Local Shares System (Final Due Date is January 31, 2017)
 - **July 2017:** Round 1 Funding First Annual Report and Round 2 Funding Allocated for 2017-18
 - **October 2017:** Round 2 District Pre-certification Review of all Local Plans
 - **December 2018:** Round 1 Funding Final Report
