- D. Updates from the Chancellor's Cabinet: Hsieh reports on the latest enrollment numbers (see attachment). Miramar's target remains 9,337. Currently the College is above target at 9,340.7. 3.7 in a positive direction. Positive attendance courses still need to be counted, they remain just projections. The numbers indicate that Miramar College is the only institution in SDCCD that is still growing. Hsieh congratulated everyone on their efforts to help the College to continue to grow. The College has been granted funding to grow to 10,050 FTES. There was a cabinet discussion about three options to grant Miramar College 10,050 FTES (see attachment). Option two was chosen whereby 175 FTES will be taken from City College and another 175 FTES will be taken away from Continuing Education. Hsieh showed a chart of students in the Palomar College service area that attend either Miramar College or Mesa College (see attachment). There will be further discussions about how to retain these students once the new Palomar College campus in Rancho Bernardo opens in summer 2018. **Hsieh** is hoping to start preparing for this challenge sooner rather than later. **Hsieh** asked the Chancellor if the San Diego Promise could be extended to students outside of the San Diego Unified School District. The Chancellor will look into this. There will be a survey of faculty to see how many use open education resources (OER) this Friday. A second survey will go out in October. There will be 6 Miramar College board agenda items for the June 8 Board of Trustees meeting. Four are routine renewals of grants that pertain to sector navigators in advanced transportation and renewable energies. There is a small \$10,000 grant with USD for teacher preparation. There is a cocurriculum change fund item from \$5,000 to \$10,000 submitted by Brett Bell.

2	Acceptance of PD Recommendation from CGC: (attachment) Murphy reports that this proposal for a professional development committee started in March of 2016 after it was determined that two of the goals in the handbook, pertaining to staff development, were not being implemented. It was brought to light at CGC that the flex coordinator does not have a committee pursuant to Title 5. CGC recommended to CEC that a taskforce be created. The parameters of forming a PD taskforce was distributed to all constituency leaders on May 9 and the strong recommendation was to support this recommendation prior to the end of the semester. McMahon reports that it passed academic senate and senate exec on May 15. The Classified Senate is yet to approve it since they believe the item was sent out on May 15 and not in time to be included on their final agenda of the academic year. Via email, Terri Hubbard requested that the item not be approved until they have had time to discuss. Ramsey stated how Classified Senate has had ample time to approve. Hsieh expresses the need to move forward since no approval is needed as input is being received on an on-going basis. Hsieh reports that the management supports this recommendation. Jacobson and Marin said that this item has not be discussed at ASG. The students will not take a position.
