





WHAT IS COLLEGIALITY IN ACTION (CIA)

- Collegiality in Action* is a joint effort of the Academic Senate of the California Community Colleges (ASCCC) and the Community College League of California (CCLC).
- The purpose of this program is to help districts and colleges successfully implement state law and regulations that call for effective participation by faculty, staff, and students in district and college governance.
 - Effective Participation Fundamentals
 - Effective Participation Focused Study
 - Issue Resolution

*Formerly referred to as 'Technical Assistance'

WHY WAS THE CIA AT MIRAMAR COLLEGE?

- CIA was brought to Miramar in 2018 to assist with:
 - **Issue Resolution** regarding breakdown in communication and **adherence to** the law as it pertained to accreditation requirements of institutional governance, Title 5 requirements, the Brown Act, and the distinct role of Faculty in Collegial Consultation (10+1) under the law (AB 1725).
 - **Effective Participation in Governance** to review and improve the College Governance Structure and Processes at Miramar to ensure alignment with above mandates and with full participation and ownership of all constituent groups.
 - CIA Facilitators were Larry Galizio, CCLC President; Julie Bruno, ASCCC President; and Helen Benjamin, HSV Consulting President.

WHAT WERE THE CIA'S INITIAL FINDINGS?

Regarding Issue Resolution

• The CIA facilitators were unable to assist with resolving the breakdown in communication and adherence to the law as it pertained to collegial consultation and governance.

Regarding Effective Participation in Governance

- The CIA Facilitators reviewed the Miramar College Governance Structure and Processes and noted the following:
 - Need for clear distinction between Academic and Professional (10+1), Participatory Governance, and Operational Matters and Committees.
 - Need to ensure effective student voice in 9 + 1 matters.
 - Need to align governance processes with Title V and the law.
 - Need for streamlined and documented process for decision making.
 - Need for common understanding of governance processes such as quorum, voting, proxies, and issue resolution.

EFFORTS FOCUSED ON EFFECTIVE PARTICIPATION-GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE AND PROCESSES

November 2018

• CIA Visiting Team met with the College Governance Leadership Team to outline plan of action for CIA activities.

March 2019

 Governance Project Review Committee held first meeting and a college-wide Governance Survey was administered.

April 2019

• Governance Forums were conducted on campus to inform campus of the goals and strategies for CIA activities and to report findings of Governance Survey.

March 2019 – September 2019

 Governance Project Review Committee met on four occasions to complete assigned tasks, primarily focusing on the re-engineering of the College Governance Structure and Processes


- Develop and recommend a structure and processes to be used in making decisions related to academic and professional matters as delineated in AB 1725

PRIMARY FOCUS OF THE WORK


- Review and understand requirements under Education Code, Title 5, Brown Act and ACCJC Accreditation Standards.
- Identify strengths, weaknesses, threats, and opportunities of current governance structure and processes.
- Clearly identify Academic and Professional Matters committees; Participatory Governance committees; and Operational committees.
- Review and improve, as needed, Governance Structures and Processes, including the College Governance Handbook.
- Clarify purpose, responsibilities, of membership of all committees.
- Clarify role and responsibilities of committee chairs and committee members.

SUMMARY OF RECOMMENDED CHANGES

- Clear description and delineation of decision making process for Academic and Professional Matters (10+1) and for Participatory Governance Matters
- Streamline of decision making by reorganization of committees under
 - Academic Senate
 - Participatory Governance
 - Operational
- Clear descriptions and standardization of practices for
 - Quorum
 - Proxies
 - Term Lengths
 - Agendas and Minutes
 - College-wide Plan Approval

UPCOMING EVENTS FOR COLLEGE GOVERNANCE REVIEW PROJECT

January/February 2020

 Governance Project Review Workgroups complete review of Draft College Governance Handbook and forwards to the College Governance Committee (CGC).

February 2020

• CGC distributes *Draft* Handbook; constituency leaders share *Draft* with constituents and receive input.

February/ March 2020

- Governance Project Review Committee and CGC hold public forums and attend constituency, committee and department meetings as requested.
- CGC meets to discuss input received by constituencies and determine changes to be incorporated into document.

April 2020

 Final Handbook is presented to constituencies for recommendation and presented to CEC for approval.

PROPOSED IMPLEMENTATION PROCESS

- April/May 2020 Committee membership determined for Fall 2020
 - Committees will retain partial membership so not to lose institutional history.
- May 2020 Campus-wide training provided
 - Review changes to governance structure
 - Review governance processes and standardization of practices
 - Review roles of committee chairs and committee members
- Fall 2020 Implement new structure and processes
- Spring 2020 Initiate evaluation process
